
Event Schedule and Map



Origin


The Shinjo Festival began in 1756, when the feudal lord Masanobu Tozawa organized a new festival for the Shinjo clan deity Tennmangu in order to lift the morale of local people who had been devastated by a severe famine and poor harvest the previous year, and to pray for bountiful crops. Ever since, the Shinjo Festival has continued as a cherished traditional event that brings pride, unity, and joy to the citizens. Shinjo warmly welcomes visitors from all over the world.

Festival Floats -Yatai-

At the Shinjo Festival, yatai are considered offerings to the gods. Each year, neighborhood groups design and build floats based on chosen themes from Noh, Kabuki, historical legends, or folktales.

These floats are funded through local donations, reflecting a strong community spirit. A total of 20 floats are created annually, but only the top three award-winning floats are preserved for one year. The rest are dismantled after the festival—so don't miss your chance to see these incredible works of art during the event!



Festival Music -Ohayashi-

At the rear of each float, musical groups perform with drums, flutes, gongs, and shamisen. Among the four traditional pieces, the melancholic Sukuwatari and the lively Kakko are most commonly played. Each group's style varies slightly, as the musical traditions are passed down orally within the community.







Mikoshi Procession

This sacred procession carries the deity of Tennmangu Shrine through the city to bless and protect the people. Starting from the site of Shinjo Castle, around 200 participants parade through the streets. Highlights include the synchronized steps of foot soldiers(Ashigaru), appearances by mythical figures like Tengu, and the grand Mikoshi (portable shrine) itself.
